The Stratford upon Avon and Midland Junction Railway by Arthur Jordan Oxford Publishing Co 1982 SBN 86093 131 5

This is the most important single source and the recognised definitive history of the SMJR . The author was the son of May Jordan who was manageress of the SMJ/LMS tea rooms at Stratford Station. He attended the local grammar school and spent much of his spare time (circa 1930) at the station in Old Town whilst waiting for his mother to finish work. The Jordan family lived for some time at 7 Windsor Street, Stratford next door to my Grandmother (8). Number 7 was demolished in recent times to allow better access for coaches turning into Mansell Street! Arthur Jordan knew many of the ex SMJ men who, no doubt, provided him with stories about the early days and he would have had the benefit of knowing the long serving "Tacker" Harris over a long period of time. His profession as a teacher allowed him to conduct his research into the line over a long period of time and it was undoubtedly a labour of love. Unlike most of the books that have been published since I have never found any factual errors in this book and much of the anecdotal material is substantiated elsewhere. (JRJ 2011)

The Stratford upon Avon Herald.

The local newspaper is available to view by arrangement at the Shakespeare Museum archive (they have a full set).

The back copies of the Stratford upon Avon Herald do yield a good deal of material and in pre 1970 editions seem to be reliable and accurate. In early times the paper employed traditional journalists and reporters who did an excellent job. Various railway related articles have appeared in that newspaper in the period 1970 onwards usually prompted by some redevelopment event on the course of the lines (ex SMJ & GWR south of Alcester Road) or a readers' letter. Many of these articles are badly researched and often shoddy journalism, more than one confuses the ex GW route and the SMJ route!. Researchers are warned to check other sources and be wary of photo captions as the modern "Herald" often gets them wrong. It is a fact that most local newspapers in recent times have had to abandon traditional journalism due to competition. They do not have the long serving reporters with local knowledge and contacts. Many pieces of "Herald" reporting on the railways of Stratford in modern times have been done by young and inexperienced reporters and are sloppy. In the future no doubt researchers will look at such reports and take them at face value. If this missive survives I warn anyone to take care in accepting the Herald post 1970 as the reliable source that it was in earlier times.

Anyone interested in the printing industry might care to read my essay on that industry in Stratford in the 1950 - 60's. It contains details of the "Herald" being printed at their own premises on early machinery.
